

NTLT receive funding to develop careers resource

We're excited to announce that we have been successful in our bid to create careers resources with The Careers and Enterprise Company (CEC).

The CEC has been seeking to fund activity proposals from Trusts to support

the development of resources and sharing of best practice in respect of four key areas of strategic
priority. North Tyneside Learning Trust is delighted to have been successful in receiving funding to
develop a set of resources for Careers Leads and schools nationally to support amplification of
technical and vocational routes for pupils who attend a SEND, PRU or alternative provision and also to
support parental engagement.

We are really pleased to be working in collaboration with 4 of our partner schools on this project: Silverdale, and Southlands Schools are heavily involved in the development of these resources along with Barnardos and Newcastle UXL. Burnside College and Longbenton High School will also be involved in the testing and roll out.

There will initially be four sets of resources focussed on the four growth sectors within the North East and we are thrilled to have the following companies involved:

Digital – Accenture Energy – A & P Group Health & Life Sciences – NHS Manufacturing – Unipres

The first prototype is almost finished and we're looking forward to receiving feedback and developing the other sets of resources. If you would like more information on this, please contact Angie at the Trust.

Science and the Science Learning Partnership

This month has been an exciting one for science within the Trust.

Two of our partner schools have taken advantage of a bursary on offer from the Trust and have started their journey towards achieving Primary Science Quality Mark. Benton Dene Primary School and Percy Main Primary School are both ready to celebrate and strengthen the excellent science already taking place within their schools and are excited for the year ahead. We have also had our first NTLT Enthuse Partnership network event with colleagues from Valley Gardens Middle School, Benton Dene Primary School, Fordley Primary School, Amberley Primary School, Denbigh Primary School and Hadrian Park Primary School. The partnership shared findings from recent CPD they had attended and ideas for enriching the curriculum with STEM clubs, links to employers, trips and visitors into schools. We have really enjoyed networking and sharing good practice, in order to raise the profile of the STEM subjects in our Trust schools.

Ice Hockey Success for Colleague

By day, Steph Towns is Sixth Form Guidance Tutor and School Careers Coordinator at Whitley Bay High School but by night she has a secret life as a champion athlete. Steph shares an insight into her life as an ice hockey player with us:



"I have played ice hockey since the age of 7 as it runs in my family with my Dad and Uncles all being well known players within the Whitley Bay Warriors set up and across the country. I am currently the head player-coach of the Whitley Bay Beacons - Women's ice hockey club and run an U16 junior girls team, a development team and play in the Elite league myself with the 1st team.

I will travel to Jaca, Spain to compete at the Women's World Championships Division 2A 3-8th April and will match up against Chinese Taipei, Latvia, Spain and Mexico. Pressure will be on to win a gold medal as this will mean promotion to the next division up. The World Championships have been cancelled the last

2 years due to the pandemic, and last time we competed we won Silver beating Korea 2-1, narrowly missing out on the gold medal game.

As well as this, I have also been selected for the Great Britain Ball Hockey team and am due to compete at the World Championships in Montreal, Canada at the end of June where we we will match up against USA, Canada, Slovakia, Czech Republic and Lebanon. Ball hockey is a sport many ice hockey players play in the summer, as it is literally ice hockey without the ice - see the pictures to avoid confusion with field hockey"

The Journey to London

We had to arrive at Newcastle Central Station at 7:55am, 7 minutes before the train departed. The train was an LNER Azuma. The total train journey was 3 hours, stopping at Darlington and York on the way to London King's Cross. People found many ways to occupy themselves on the way, such as playing card games, reading a book or even just chatting. Luckily, we got a little treat and some water delivered to our seats!

Arriving in London

When we arrived at London Kings Cross, we were required to take the tube over 2 lines to get to Westminster. We briefly had lunch before we entered the Houses of Parliament building for our tour.

Preparing for the Tour

The best part of the trip was the tour of the Houses of Parliament. When we arrived, we were given visitor passes which proved we were permitted to be there as the security was understandably very high. We then had to go through a security scanner and X-ray our bags like an airport. After that, we had to place our bags in a cage that got locked away until the end of the tour.

The Houses of Parliament Tour

There were 2 particular dates that appeared on pieces of the building. These were the dates of which the oldest pieces of the building were built. After that, we were led inside to the Central Lobby. We got to see the former House of Commons that had been rebuilt after fires in 1834. We were then told briefly about how a law or 'bill' starts and is made before being told various different facts about the House of Commons and House of Lords. After this, we got to sit in the viewing gallery and watch a debate take place in the House of Commons. It was about offering support to women who need help when in labour or giving birth. The Secretary of State for Health & Social Care, Sajid Javid, was representing the Conservative Party. After this, we learnt about the House of Lords and even got the opportunity to speak to a Lord. Unlike MPs, Lords and Baronesses are not elected but are specially chosen for their expertise in certain areas. The Lord we had a chance to meet had been appointed a while ago after previous work with Tony Blair. We were told about an incident with Charles I and 5 MPs which resulted in a civil war from 1642 to 1651. This is the reason the Monarch is not allowed in the House of Commons. She is, however, allowed in the House of Lords once a year to 'open' parliament, announcing all new laws for a new parliamentary year.







Pupils return to High Borrans

This term its been great seeing so many children from Trust Partner Schools take part in residential trips again. One of the popular venues is High Borrans in the Lake District which offers brilliant outdoor experiences in a very picturesque setting. We asked out friends at High Borrans to tell us what it's been like over the last 2 years more importantly, what it's been like having staff and students from North Tyneside Learning Trust school visiting them again:



"Fifteen months is a long time especially in the life of a child. That's how long High Borrans had to close its doors to North Tyneside's children during the pandemic's darkest times. Furlough, distancing, isolating, lockdowns: as we all learned a new language the children that needed our service most remained unable to visit.

We re-opened towards the end of June last year, initially providing day courses in Tyneside and eventually smaller residential courses arrived back at the centre above Windermere. Nine months later and the sound of a coach full of children leading up our drive still feels like a breath of fresh air. As March ends, we have now returned to full occupancy. The privilege of introducing children to the joys of the Lake District feels richer than ever. Helping them catch up, breath, play, explore or discover is simply more rewarding for the centre team than ever before.

Brilliant support from North Tyneside and the furlough scheme have allowed us to still be here The team are looking forwards to a summer filled with bookings and fun. Visiting staff have returned like old friends through our red front door. Talk is now of the future: developments, investments, play, adventures, and new schools. The planning to restart our Young Leaders and Primary Enrichment schemes with the Friends of High Borrans is now underway for next school year.




Robotics Competition Success

On the 23rd March 2022 Marden High School had a team of Year 9 students, Marden Matrix, attend the regional finals for the VEX Robotics Tipping Point



Competition. Thanks to a grant from the Reece Foundation they were able to build, code, and drive their robot, named Keanu, to victory in a tense battle with 15 other North East teams. The event took place at the Nissan Sports and Leisure Complex which saw a build up of challenges including individual driver competitions, autonomous programming, ranking games and finally the knockout stages where they were victorious along with their alliance team. One of our students also picked up an award for 'best driver' in the individual challenges. They have earned their place in the National Competition later this month which is taking place in Telford. This is a fantastic achievement and one which the boys richly deserve with all the hard work they have put in.
