



Oli approaches all aspects of his school life with pride and positivity, and perfectly demonstrates the attitude needed to succeed in whatever he puts his mind to.

OLIVER FERGUSON, YEAR 5, WOODLAWN SCHOOL

Ollie joined our school after struggling in a mainstream setting. Since joining Ollie has thrived. He attends school all day, has a great friendship group and is even a school councillor! He is kind, caring and shows empathy towards his peers and teachers. Ollie is confident around school also. He has made friendships across the whole school and enjoys being a buddy to younger children. When Ollie joined us he had an aversion to literacy. He now regularly writes dramatic and thrilling stories and enjoys reading. Staff throughout school often comment about how polite and friendly he is.

OLIVIA MADDISON, YEAR 4, REDESDALE PRIMARY SCHOOL

Olivia has presented as quite shy in previous years, but this year she has started to show her confidence. This is encouraged by her prolific writing of non-fiction books. Since the start of the year, Olivia has written 6 books, by hand, all beautifully illustrated and bound. She has done all of this in her own time and has been confident to share and talk about these books to the other children. After losing two of her grandparents to cancer Maya has worked very hard in fundraising for wonderful cancer charities. She has run the Children's Cancer North, helped set up a wonderful Macmillan coffee morning on our driveway raising £262 and donated lots of toys to sell at a local car boot sale to raise funds for a half marathon mighty hike for Macmillan. Since joining school Elliot has overcome many challenges linked to his TAR syndrome. Everyday activities can present challenges for Elliot, however, no challenge is too big for him to overcome. He demonstrates a 'can do' attitude and approaches everything with determination and resilience. Due to his physical disability Elliot has had to find ways to be independent. A huge hurdle for Elliot is his speech and language difficulty, however, he has persevered with his targets and is striving each day to ensure his voice is heard. His positivity and enthusiasm shines through in everything he does.

LIA DILLON, YEAR 2, BEACON HILL SCHOOL

Lia consistently demonstrates determination and persistence in all aspects of the curriculum. She has recently begun to use an Eye Gaze Communication Aid in order to communicate her wants and needs throughout the day. She can ask us when she needs juice or fruit or if she wants help. She also makes us laugh and cry and knows how to get around us by saying kind and caring things to us. Lia tries hard in all aspects of her learning, she swims within school and does rebound therapy working with Physios and Occupational Therapists.

LUCAS FARTHING, YEAR II, MOORBRIDGE ALTERNATIVE EDUCATION PARTNERSHIP SCHOOL

When Lucas first joined us we faced many challenges that we worked with Lucas to address. Behaviour was often disruptive and Lucas found it difficult to manage his emotions. Now in Year 11, he has matured into a polite, caring and motivated young man. Behaviour in school is excellent and he has positive relationships with staff members he sees regularly. He has worked hard towards achieving the qualifications he deserves. Lucas often makes the choice to stay behind after school by himself to catch up. This attitude is typical of Lucas. Recently, Lucas applied for one of five apprenticeship roles offered by HMRC to students leaving school and we're pleased to share that he has been successful in

Carter has PDA (Pathological Demand Avoidance) and going to school is an enormous hurdle. Carter struggled to engage in any kind of formal learning in Reception so his transition to Year One could have been disastrous... but it wasn't! Carter is working so hard in his phonics that he has made a year's progress in one term! He lights up the classroom with his wicked sense of humour and brilliant ideas. Carter's PDA doesn't stop him from coming back for more and his resilience and tenacity should be commended.

LEXI CHRISTENSEN. YEAR 6. HADRIAN PARK PRIMARY SCHOOL

Following the pandemic, Lexi struggled to re-integrate into school life. On beginning her final year, Lexi knew that a change needed to happen. Throughout her time in Year 6, Lexi has shown a significant improvement in her attitude towards school and commitment to learning. Lexi approaches work positively, asking when she is unsure and supporting others when she feels confident enough to do so. Lexi has worked hard to overcome barriers, developed friendships, committed time to catching up with learning and attends school both happy and confidently.

LOGAN LATIMER. YEAR 9. SOUTHLANDS SCHOOL

When Logan first started at Southlands School he was very stressed and anxious and would often walk out if staff tried to support him; he also struggled to engage with his peers. During COVID our school split into bubbles which enabled Logan to build positive trusting relationships with key staff. Logan started to enjoy completing work and found an interest in sharing his ideas. This led to Logan volunteering to be part of our student council. Logan has also begun to attend clubs outside of school to support his mental health at home.

MOLLIE WATT, YEAR 10, MONKSEATON HIGH SCHOOL

Mollie has struggled with her mental health and a diagnosis of ADHD. The pressures of being in the busy school environment were very overwhelming for her. Mollie was determined to achieve the GCSE qualifications needed to enter Paediatric Nursing. In Year 9, Mollie started on a partial timetable and realised that if she was to have the best chance of doing well, she needed to be in school full time. Since the start of Year 10, Mollie has been on a full time timetable. Each time she has a difficult time, Mollie gets herself back on track and tries again. Mollie has made a close group of friends and has started to feel more confident.

KATELYN GILLIS, YEAR 4, GRASMERE ACADEMY

Katelyn is like a beam of sunshine. Her sensitivity towards others is outstanding and she is always the first to notice if someone is sad or struggling and will do what she can to help. We have many children in the class with SEND and she seems to know instinctively how to offer the help they need: she will quietly give ear defenders to someone she can see is finding things too loud or she will be aware if a child has lost their place and try to help. No one has asked her to do these things, she just does it as part of her day to day play.

MAISHA ULLAH, YEAR I. BENTON DENE PRIMARY SCHOOL

Maisha is a proudly Muslim little girl. In school this year we looked at 'The Proudest Blue' by Ibitihaj Muhammad. The story is about a girl who wears her hijab for school for the first time. Maisha was very proud that she had a hijab and offered to bring it to school so her year group could see it and ask questions. She then demonstrated how to pray and the routines she completes at home and at the Mosque; she shared her own prayer mat, books and her favourite prayer teddy. She explained Ramadan and the reason behind fasting and how important it is to be charitable and look after everybody.

TABITHA MOHUN, YEAR 2. RICHARDSON DEES PRIMARY SCHOOL

Tabitha is a lovely girl with a wonderfully positive attitude. She is an extremely kind, caring and responsible member of the class. Tabitha can work well independently or as part of a group. She encourages and supports her peers, demonstrating patience and kindness when listening to others express their own thoughts and ideas. 

He has been involved in a ten week Boys Wellbeing Group who have explored various barriers to growing up and met with building societies to promote and design a 'how to deal with and look after your finances' leaflet for teenagers. Bailey does not let anything stand in his way on a daily basis and always tries his best in everything that is thrown at him. Ask him a joke, he has many and a brilliant sense of humour.

JACK LISLE, YEAR 10, SILVERDALE SCHOOL

Jack has managed to maintain a sense of humour in the face of his unsettled living situation, looking at the positives each change has presented. Jack wants to manage his emotions and become a productive member of society. To have this goal, he has had to overcome feelings of hopelessness; when I first began working with him, he did not think that he would ever be able to hold down a job, or succeed in any way due to his diagnosis of ADHD. However, after many discussions looking at examples of people who have managed to succeed in life despite their own diagnosis, he is beginning to believe that he can achieve this.

RYAN MCGUIRE, YEAR II, MOORBRIDGE ALTERNATIVE EDUCATION PARTNERSHIP SCHOOL

Ryan was referred to MAEPS when he was in Year 7 and it wasn't long until we began to see issues which prevented him from building relationships with others. In 2022 Ryan had to deal with the tragic loss of his dad. Instead of contributing to his high level of disengagement with school, Ryan used this as a catalyst to help him regain focus. The number one goal he set himself was to make his dad proud. Ryan approached his final year with an inspirational positive attitude. His attendance has dramatically improved. He has made a number of positive peer relationships in his class built on respect. He supports others both with learning as well as offering a listening ear when others are going through difficult times.
